
On September 10th, our Forest Lakes Nursery School opened its doors to 15 bright-eyed 3 - 4 year olds this school season.

# Community Upkeep

It's that time again. If you see someone walking around on the dam as you drive by, no worries, it is time for our full, formal dam inspection to take place. Every two years the state requires the dam be officially inspected, cleared of unwanted vegetation and confirmed that everything is where it is supposed to be.

A couple more picnic tables got much-needed facelifts, having their rotten boards removed and replaced. And two lovely benches were erected on Cove and Harbor View beaches in remembrance of Karen Campbell and Luke Wolters.

With the fall season upon us, a reminder to all that dumping on Forest Lakes property is strictly prohibited. The dumping of any type of material, including: grass clippings, brush, branches,

leaves, logs, trees, tires, trash, old wood, construction materials, etc., is prohibited and against the law. If you are using a landscaping company, please make sure they also understand this. Dumping on the lake property is harmful to our beautiful environment, looks terrible and in the long run, lowers the value of all our homes. We need your help – don't dump, or if you see someone dumping on lake property either inform them it's prohibited and they should remove any dumped material or report it to the Byram police immediately.

Also, with the season over, please make sure your boats are properly stored, upside down in the racks or taken back to your home. They should not be left on the beach or allowed to collect mosquito-breeding rainwater.

### LOCAL FINDS...

It was suggested that the News Bole could feature some local, wonderful places our neighbors have discovered and think you may want to check out if you haven't already. I think it is a great idea. This first suggestion came by way of my husband who reminded me of the Lakota Wolf Preserve. It is in Columbia NJ, about 40 minutes from here. www.lakotawolf.com



Since its inception in 1998, the Lakota Wolf Preserve, has been a non-profit dedicated to the care of, and education about, wolves, bobcats, foxes, and lynx.

The Wolf Watch tours are led by owner Jim Stein and Becky Mace, who have raised and care for all the animals at the preserve. During their presentations, you will learn about the social structure of wolf packs, their eating habits, their interaction with man, and many other interesting facts. They will try to educate you about the true behavior of the wolf and are glad to answer any questions you may have. While in the observation area you will be able to watch the wolves play, interact with each other and maybe even hear them howl! Truly an experience of a lifetime. You will also get to see and learn about their foxes, bobcat and lynx that live at the preserve.

They are not open to the public all day. The only way to see the wolves is by reserving a guided tour, held twice a day. Tours book up so you need to make a reservation in advance.

Tours are \$16

for adults, \$7 for children and last about 75 minutes.

The tours are all outdoors on uneven ground with no paved roads at the preserve. They have a shuttle bus with a chair lift that can drive you from the parking area to the front gate of the preserve. From where the bus drops you off, it is about 75 yards uphill on gravel to the observation area to see the wolves and hear the presentation.

#### TIDBITS

#### Oh Nuts!

If you've spent any time outside anywhere, chances are you have spotted an eastern gray squirrel. They can often be seen leaping from tree to tree, chasing other squirrels around tree trunks, or perched on your deck railing nibbling on nuts and seeds.

They use their long tails and sharp claws for balance while climbing, running, and leaping between tree branches. They will happily feast on nuts, acorns, seeds, berries, fruit, and anything else they manage to scavenge. When their typical food is scarce, the squirrels will also consume insects (adults and larvae), juvenile birds, bird eggs and amphibians.

Squirrels are most active during the day and can be seen all year. At the end of the summer, gray squirrels will store seeds and nuts to feed on when food is scarce during the winter months. A gray squirrel can hide 25 nuts in a half an hour and can make hundreds of caches. Most nuts are buried at the surface, with few more than 1/4 inch below the ground. About 85% of the nuts may be recovered, while the remainder occasionally will germinate. Squirrels can smell buried nuts under a foot of snow and when the snow is deep, they will tunnel under it to get closer to the scent.

Eastern gray squirrels can grow 9 to 12 inches in length and reach two pounds upon maturity. Despite their name, they come in a variety of colors, and will often display a mix of gray, brown, black, and

cinnamon fur. Their long-haired, bushy tails can grow to be roughly as long as their bodies. This tail has many uses. It is used for balance, for heat, as an umbrella, for communication and as a rudder when

swimming. Squirrels make a variety of sounds including a harsh chirping or chattering noise when they are angry or scared.

Gray squirrels reach sexual maturity at 12 months and can mate up to twice a year. One mating season is in late winter, and the other is in mid-summer, depending on food availability.



Mother squirrels have 2 to 4 babies. The young are born blind and hairless. Their eyes begin to open after approximately 28 to 35 days. When they are 42 to 49 days old their furry coats fully develop and they begin to venture from the nest. The average life expectancy for an adult squirrel is six years, and the records for maximum lifespan are 12 years in the wild and 20 years in captivity.

As the trees lose their foliage, you may notice large, round clumps of leaves in the branches. These are squirrel nests—also known as dreys. These structures

can be a foot or two wide and are usually located 20 feet or higher up a tree that provides good squirrel food, like an acorn-bearing oak. For stability, they're built near the trunk or at the fork of two strong branches. These scraggly-looking nests consist of leafy branches, with an inner layer of soft material like moss and pine needles. The squirrels enter the drey through a hole facing the trunk. Squirrels use dreys in summer, but they prefer to spend the cold months in a more protected place, like a tree cavity or even an attic.

During periods of severe cold, they can stay in their dens or nests for several days at a time, only coming out to visit their stores of food.

Squirrels are fun to watch especially when they are performing their death defying, acrobatic routines. They usually seem quite innocuous, and for the most part they

are. They are hardly ever found to have rabies or transmit them to humans. But they can be quite troublesome when they gnaw on home structures for nesting purposes. Squirrels are also responsible for many

electrical hazards by chewing on insulation and exposing wires. In 1987, a squirrel gnawed on a power line at the NASDAQ computer center, shutting down stock trading for over an hour. So just think about that the next time one is looking you in the eye with that innocent 'it wasn't me' look. They



may just be plotting the next big power outage at JCP&L.

# Water line markings.



# SWIMMING & BEACH RULES

#### LIFGUARDS -



When lifeguards are on duty....

- The Lifeguards and the Beach Manager are in charge of the beaches when on duty.
- · The lifequards may remove any swimmer from the water for failing to comply with the rules or creating a danger to themselves or others.
- The Beach Manager or Lifeguards may close the beach area or portion thereof, for such times as are necessary for maintenance and repair, special events, lightning storms and safety of the membership.
- · Lifeguard responsibility is for swimmers in the "Designated Swimming Areas" ONLY.
- Those swimmers that swim outside the "Designated Swimming Areas," do so at their own risk.
- Swimmers wishing to swim outside the "Designated Swimming Areas" cannot access the Lake through the "Designated Swimming Areas" unless specifically noted. (\*See the "Recommended Locations for Accessing Unguarded Areas of the Lake") -

Beaches Open @ 11:00 am

When lifeguards are not on duty follow the rules posted on back of lifeguard chair!

#### **BEACHES/SWIMMING**



- · Children under 12 years of age must be accompanied by an adult or a responsible supervisor at all times while on the beach. A responsible supervisor must be 16 years of age or older.
- · Toddlers must be attended to by an adult while in the water.
- · Non-swimmers are not allowed beyond the rope.
- Swimmers of all abilities may use personal floatation devices such as swimmies, life preservers, tubes, etc., inside the ropes.
- The use of rafts is not permitted inside the ropes.
- Flotation devices may not be used in deep water to access the raft by non-swimmers.
- · No pushing or shoving on the rafts or docks.
- No diving off the back of the rafts or docks (out of sight of the lifeguard).
- · No swimming under or behind the rafts or docks.
- The docks at Cove are closed during swim team practice and meets.
- · Loud, foul or abusive language and disruptive conduct is not permitted. The beaches are intended for family fun and relaxation.
- · Glass containers are not permitted in beach areas.
- · No Smoking on the beach.
- No swimming when lifeguard is off duty.
- No fishing is allowed inside of designated swimming areas, including after hours.

# BOATS 🚣



- · All Boats and kayaks, MUST enter and return to shore outside of the "Designated Swim Areas"
- Life preservers are required for kayaks and boats Thank you.

#### ATTENTION BOAT OWNERS

If you have your boat docked anywhere at Forest Lakes - in the boat racks or along the lake perimeter, you MUST have a CURRENT BOAT TAG. The Board will soon be inspecting ALL boats to see if boat tags are affixed. If you don't have a current tag call Dorothy Gorman at 973-786-5111.



# FOREST LAKES CLUB POLICIES











#### **DESIGNATED SWIM AREAS**

- -Main Beach As designated by roped areas.
- **-Cove Beach –** From the beach to the last swim team lane line. The back of the left dock is considered outside the swim area and the far ladder on the left swim team dock can be used when swimming across the lake.
- **-Harbor View –** This beach is unguarded and there is no defined swim area.
- -Boardwalk As designated by roped areas.



FOR ACCESSING UNGUARDED AREAS OF THE LAKE

- -Main Beach Enter/return area is off the volleyball court area
- **-Cove Beach –** Enter/return area is at the end of the left swim team dock. The ladder on the left swim team dock CAN be used to enter and return to Cove Beach from an open water swim.
- -Harbor View Beach Enter/return at any point
- **-Boardwalk Beach –** Swimmers with or without flotation devices must enter/return anywhere to the right of the "Designated Swimming Area."

#### NO DUMPING

We've noticed lately that there is an increase in dumping on Forest Lakes property near the Lake.

A reminder to all that dumping on Forest Lakes property is strictly prohibited.

The dumping of any type of material, including: grass clippings, brush, logs, trees, tires, trash, old wood, construction materials, branches, leaves, etc., is prohibited and AGAINST THE LAW.

WE NEED YOUR HELP - don't dump, or if you see someone dumping on lake property, please report it to the Byram police immediately. This includes blowing leaves onto lake property.

Dumping on the lake property is harmful to our beautiful environment, looks terrible and, in the long run, lowers the value of all of our homes.



#### DOG POLICY

NO DOGS (OR ANY DOMESTIC PETS) WILL BE ALLOWED ON OUR BEACHES OR TO SWIM IN THE WATERS AT FOREST LAKES.

PLEASE CONTINUE TO PICK UP AFTER YOUR DOG BUT DO NOT PUT DOG WASTE IN BEACH TRASH CANS, AS IT MAY ATTRACT OTHER ANIMALS. PLEASE DISPOSE OF WASTE AT HOME.

Byram Township and Andover Township **LEASH LAWS** require dogs to be on leashes at all times outside of their owner's residence (code 87.12 for Byram Twp., Chapter 20-21 for Andover Twp.).

#### **GUEST POLICY**

A **GUEST** is a non-Forest Lakes resident that comes to the beach occasionally and is **ALWAYS** accompanied by a member in good standing. One exception is that SENIORS do not need to accompany guests.

The guest policy was not set up to give friends complimentary membership. It is there to enhance your membership experience.

Also, active members of the Forest Lakes Club may not extend guest privileges to non-member Forest Lakes residents.
